
Now we move forward to this 2022-2024 biennium as we encourage, enrich, enlighten, and equip our members as it is written in the LWML Pledge:

As God's people, it is important to be in God's Word, but sometimes we need someone to chew God's Word with us. Together we point out to each other how Christ is active in each of our lives. This helps us focus on what God's Word tells us. Forever, O Lord, your word is firmly fixed in the 12 heavens. Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path (Psalm 119:89;105). We work together keeping our priorities in the correct order even when the worldly order appeals to us and we are tempted to follow that order. We focus on Jesus together in our everyday lives. Our LWML sisters walk hand in hand as they study and read God's Word together "serving the Lord with gladness" in their local congregations and communities. When we gather at conventions, rallies, meetings, and retreats, we encourage each other by sharing our activities and fellowship.

I want to share some ideas I received from fellow LWML women over the years:

- Open your Bible and lay it on your kitchen counter, dresser or bathroom vanity. Let two or three verses speak to you. Tomorrow read more on those pages or turn to another passage and do the same. Keep going daily. At your next society meeting, share how God spoke to you. I am amazed at this influence in my life.
- Before you go to sleep at night, list in your mind the blessings you received during the day. You will find that you fall asleep in Jesus' arms, wallowing in His blessings.
- Before your feet hit the floor each morning, "Put on the full armor of God" (Ephesians 6:14-17). Satan shudders and will scatter.

These activities that I stress to young women focus on God's Word which transforms and renews us like nothing else will. Whether we are a young woman or a seasoned LWML woman, God's Word works in us.

Our convention is now in the rearview mirror and it's time to start looking forward to summer. I know some of the groups do not meet during the summer due to vacations and other activities. However, it is not a time to take a break from being in the Word.

I recently received an email with the latest post from Donna Snow identifying The 13 Best Bible Study Methods. These methods can be used by you in your private Bible study time. With Donna's permission, I'm listing those 13 methods.

Here are Donna Snow's 13 Bible study methods:

#### First Things First: Start with Prayer

Scripture is God's breath exhaled onto the page. Focusing your mind and thoughts on Him comes first and foremost. Always begin your study time with prayer.

Method #1: Study One Book of the Bible at a time Expect to spend 3–4 weeks and read

through several times.

Method #2: Read Straight Through the Bible

It's not necessary to start with Genesis, but

read all 66 books.

Method #3: Write Out Parts of the Bible

Writing it down commits it to memory.

Method #4: Character Study

Who's who in the Bible and why do they

matter?

Method #5: Topical Bible Study

Pick a topic such as temptation, peace,

forgiveness and research.

**Method #6:** Memorize Scripture

Focus on portions of Scripture that speak to

your current situation.

Method #7: Bible Journaling (the SOAP Method)

Write down **S**cripture, record **O**bservations,

Apply and Pray.

Method #8: Single Word Study

Search Scripture for every instance a word

is used (love, fear, humility, etc.).

Method #9: Coloring Scripture (Bible Marginalia) -

Meditate on a verse as you highlight or

color in margins.

Method #10: Read Scripture Like a Novel - Visualize

the surroundings and events.

Method #11: Pray Through the Psalms

Every emotion we experience can be found

in the Psalms.

Method #12: Pull Out Your Biblical Maps -

Understand the geography of where various

events occurred.

Method #13: Use Bible Flash Cards -

Use for learning books of the Bible, Biblical

characters, and timelines.

#### Joy Markus - "Sharing the Gospel"

Joy's presentation was very intriguing as she updated her audience on what has happened in her life since we last heard from her. She had a great testimony on how faithful God has been through two surgeries, Covid, and her marriage. She loves teaching young Muslim children about Jesus and how He can be active in their lives. They come back week after week wanting to hear more. Soon parents may come too. They also have many refugees from Ukraine. POBLO has expanded to a great extent.







#### **OGT - Compassion for Many**

The breakout session on Orphan Grain Train, led by Sheri Adkins, allowed for open discussion and excitement for the opportunities to help.

Many of the attendees were familiar with Orphan Grain Train and the work they do. As an active volunteer for Orphan Grain Train, Sheri shared ideas on the needs of OGT that people had not thought of – i.e., tools, sewing

machines, toys, and medical supplies, just to name a few. She also had a handout with the various kits that can be made and where to find the information.

The sessions were also enhanced by the working knowledge of several attendees. Rev. Reed Stockman volunteers in Morris, MN, and spoke of the needs he knew of. Sonia Gunderson from Vergas, MN, talked about all the items she had that were shipped to the Ysleta Mission, including a baptismal font that was made in Perham, MN.



### Carol VonSoosten - "LWML Gift Planning"

When we think of Gift Planning, we typically think of wills, estates, and finance. Carol VonSoosten brings a whole new perspective to this thought process...that of a Christian. What can we leave our family by way of a blessing or Christian wishes or reasons for our final decisions? 
Carol is the counselor for our district. She introduced us to Katy Giffords, who is also working with the LWML in our


grow? Then, how do we minister or share God's love with others using our gifts? Carole shared how we can be ourselves, step out, and share God's amazing love with joy.






#### **Opening Worship**

#### **Convention Bible Study**

Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go (Joshua 1:9b), was the basis for the Bible study led by Reverend Sam Pitsch, of Our Redeemer, Moorhead. He began the study defining the word fear:

- An unpleasant, often strong emotion caused by anticipation or awareness of danger, evil or pain.
- An expression of anxiety concerning the outcome of something or the safety and wellbeing of someone.

As people at their tables talked about the very real fears in our world today, fears for our children growing up in this world today headed the list. The physical dangers of violence, as well as fears of the unknown, were among many listed by the group.

We recognized anxiousness in sharing the Good News with friends and family — will we be rejected or hurt? Religion has become divisive. Pastor reminded us that the Gospel unifies, Satan divides.

Rev. Pitsch gave examples of <u>rational</u> fears, such as those that center around the faith of our children; fears that are real versus <u>irrational</u> fears, those that are fictitious, unreal. God says do not be afraid. Trust Him.

Biblical characters who were afraid, had real fears.. The Israelites as they crossed the Red Sea with the Egyptians following gave them great fear. Adam and Eve feared God after they sinned. King Herod feared when he heard Jesus was born, and

he threw fear on his people as he ordered all baby boys under the age of two to be killed. Jeremiah and many of the prophets were fearful for their lives as they spoke God's messages to the people of Israel. Queen Esther had real fears for the welfare of her people and feared for her own life as the Queen, being a Jew. Jonah, Job and many others were recalled by the group.

We recognized fear as a tool and a weapon used in our world today. It is used to intimidate and to gain control of people and situations. It is used in politics and political ads. It is a powerful emotion used against us. Terrorism is a form of fear.

However, we can take comfort in the fact that in the Bible, there are 365 times we can find exhortation or commands that overcome fear spoken by our Lord. Among them:

- Do not be afraid. Peace be with you. Be strong and courageous. Do not be anxious about anything...Do not be dismayed. Take heart it is I believe. Cast your burden on the Lord;
- We looked at many examples of miracles of Jesus; He is the REMEDY to all our fears He brings salvation and LIFE;
- The raising of Jairus' daughter and healing the sick woman. "Do not fear, only believe" (Mark 5).
- Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom (Luke 12:32).
- No worries he provides for the lilies in the field, He will provide for you (Luke 12);
- Rev. Pitsch pointed out miracles that illustrated the opposite of fears such as scarcity:

- Miracle of feeding the 5,000 created abundance.
- Miracles of catching fish led to abundance so the nets almost broke both boats full.
- Running out of wine at the wedding in Cana, Jesus gave an abundance...and the best.
- Rev. Pitsch stated "Miracles foreshadow what will be in eternity."
- We saw fear in the disastrous storms on the Sea of Galilee Jesus calmed the storms. Jesus has control over creation.

We are sinners not in harmony, but in eternity there will be harmony in the new creation.

Lepers were isolated. Jesus healed and brought them into community. Eternal life will bring fellowship

In the fear of death, we look to the resurrection when we will be raised to life everlasting. We know the outcome! In Revelation 21, Jesus tells us He will wipe away our tears and there will be no more death and dying.

Rev. Pitsch encouraged us to replace fear with faith. Abide in the Word; believe His promises. Replace fear with confidence. Profess Jesus is Lord; believe it; talk about it. Show confidence in Christ!

HOPE is the assurance of Jesus' return. The Peace of Christ is with us.
