"Forgive us our sins, for we ourselves also forgive everyone who is indebted to us" (Luke 11:4).

That sounds similar to what we know as the Fifth Petition of the Lord's Prayer, but different. It's the way St. Luke recorded it. And, yet, is it not still telling us the same basic thing? Our Lord moved this petition to be recorded in slightly different words on purpose, I believe. Because He is omniscient, He knew how much trouble we would have living it because of our sinful nature.

Do you not also find this a most difficult petition to live? How easily do you find it to forgive those who sin against you? Because it is so difficult, there can develop the tendency to not even try, or to only give it lip service. Maybe you've even caught yourself mumbling under your breath, "They don't deserve to be forgiven after what they did!"

But how then should we expect our Lord to forgive us our sins against Him (and we must remember that all sins are first and foremost against God and only secondarily against our fellow man)? Even though we are repeatedly unfaithful, God is always faithful and just (2 Tim. 2:13). He will forgive us, not as we deserve but as He has promised—thanks be to God!

And yet, He does look for fruit of the Spirit in all who are His. Thus, as His disciples, we strive to forgive remembering how much and how completely He forgives us. May we use this season of Lent to strive to learn better how to live the life of a repentant disciple of our blessed Savior all our days; to His glory, our salvation and the furtherance of His kingdom of grace.
