Three crosses: two criminals "receiving the due reward" of their deeds; between them the Lamb of God, sinless and innocent. The preparation for the crucifixion was accomplished. Jesus had been mocked and beaten. He was flogged, a brutal act that killed many of its victims. A crown of thorns placed on His head was struck time and again. And then they nailed Jesus to the cross.

While one criminal continues scoffing Jesus, the other repents, "Remember me, Jesus, when You come into Your kingdom." The criminal becomes a prophet, proclaiming that this is the Son of God, suffering for the sins of the world.

Out of the blackness of the day comes the ray of light and of hope. What sign of royalty did the criminal see among the spittle, the blood, the nails, the torture, the jeers of the crowds, the cross from which the bruised body of Christ hung? He saw not with the eyes of sight, but with the eyes of faith, the baby Jesus, whose birth was heralded by angels and whose death opened the very gates of heaven.

The criminal made a confession of Christ, seeing in Him the King of heaven itself. In the midst of His own suffering, Christ sustained the repentant criminal with forgiveness and the promise of Paradise

when his eyes closed in death.

"Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb. 4:16).
