# Hints and Thanks from the Structure Committee

It has been a good year! Many positive things have happened and we thank the Lord for all He has done and all the guidance He has given to our MNN District LWML. When we put out a special plea for societies to send in their bylaws for filing, some of the comments were:

- 1. "I don't know if we have any." There should be a copy of your bylaws with each and every one of your members and a copy in the files of each of your officers and ESPECIALLY one in the secretary's records.
- 2. "Why do we need bylaws? We wouldn't follow them anyway." You need bylaws so that your parliamentary actions are specific and consistent. And yes, you do need to follow them so your actions are not just at the whim of your leaders.
- 3. "I thought we sent ours in already."
  Perhaps you did send them in at one time.
  But has your most current one been approved by the structure committee and filed in the district files?
- 4. "Oh, yes, we're reviewing ours and will send them in when we get them finished."

Note: Standing rules are related to details of the administration of the organization, rather than to parliamentary procedures. Standing rules can be changed easily by a majority vote at any meeting.

Good to hear you're reviewing your bylaws... keep up the good work and send them to the District Structure Committee for approval when finished.

AND, please don't get discouraged if after you've diligently worked on them and sent them to the District Structure Committee, they send them back to you with some suggestions. Use those suggestions, if they are helpful, read the corrected copy to your society...get their approval and vote for adoption and then send the corrected and adopted copy back to the District Structure Committee for filing in the district files.

As I was going over the society bylaws that were on file or that came in after we issued that special plea to send in bylaws, there were several things I especially looked for and OFTEN didn't find.

\*\*At the beginning of the bylaws the name of the district, region, zone or congregation was not mentioned. Usually the society name was there, but generally one or two of the above were missing. That makes it very hard to keep accurate records.

\*\*The next thing I looked for was the date those bylaws had been amended and adopted. Often that was not there. Another thought....if they are over 7 – 8 years old, it's time to review them. Things change, you know.

#### Capitalization "Know How"

To know what to capitalize and the use of acronyms is always difficult. Following are a few hints:

- The acronyms LCMS and LWML are not acceptable on first reference. In bylaws or press releases the first reference should include the full name with the acronym in parentheses such as: Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML), and from then on just "LWML" may be used.

Capitalize titles when referring to specific LWML positions of office. Otherwise, capitalize titles only when preceding the name. For example: The LWML Meeting Manager arranges housing for the Board of Directors. The Carolinas District has a meeting manager. President Jones will speak at the rally. Counselor Greim will present the study at the Alexandria Zone Rally. The Christian Growth Committee will meet on January 23, 2009 after the planning meeting. Donna Jones is our zone president. (Capitalize "district", "zone", "committee", etc., only when part of a proper name.)

#### SEEKING WAYS TO LEAD

The LWML has long sought ways to make meetings more fun and more meaty rather than boring and unproductive. We participants in the post-modern world of instant food, instant communication and instant gratification place the highest value on our TIME. Perhaps it is TIME for a reexamination of what the function of a meeting is; what roles are involved; and how to separate planning from reporting and dreaming from implementing.

The goal of our interest session at the convention was to provoke LWML members to evaluate their meetings, and enable them to refocus the purpose of meetings and to restore productivity and satisfaction among the participants. We did a sketch that exaggerated the point of a business out of hand. Some of the clues that show that a meeting is off the track:

Poor Attitude – What is the general attitude? Are the members focused on the meeting task and are there many negative comments. You may notice the lack of attention; fidgeting and paper shuffling.

**Threatened Agenda** – Perhaps there isn't an agenda prepared before the meeting. If there is an agenda, it isn't followed. Maybe the business was presented in a long-winded

Lack of Courtesy – How do the members treat each other? Is the leader on time and does the meeting start on time? Do members get critical, even sarcastic? Even if you are a small group, is formal order followed?

Lack of Commitment – How prepared are the members? Are members prepared to discuss the issues at hand? In order to avoid major conflict and lengthy discussions, a few options could be offered in an effort to "please everybody" while avoiding a discussion to reconsider the event. Maybe nobody wants to accept responsibility for serving the organization at a leadership level.

Lack of Spiritual Focus – Do you have "spiritual food" at every meeting or is there just a hurried prayer? Are the members lacking a sense of worshipful service to their Lord?

It is important for leaders to learn to manage relative conflict; to keep people engaged and lead them to passionate discussions that could result in innovative solutions.

Mining for Conflict - When groups of people come together to talk about things that matter, disagreements will occur. How (cont. on page 24)

those issues are resolved can make meetings productive, engaging and even fun. Avoiding issues that merit debate and disagreement can result in boring meetings and frustration later can manifest itself in some form of unproductive personal conflict or politics. So a leader is forced to seek out and uncover any important issues about which the members disagree, bring them out into the open and allow the discussion and resolution.

**Getting to the Real Issues** – Sometimes the issue isn't what vegetable to cook or even whom to please. The real, unspoken issue is that not all the members agreed upon the importance of the dinner. No real worshipful purpose has been attached to it. So much depends on how the leader handles the meeting. Is she caring and loving to all at the meeting?

**Giving Permission to Disagree** – Conflict can be expected. It is important for the leader to give each person the chance to engage in the discussion. It is also important for the leader to make each person feel valued for their opinions when the goal is to make the team and its activities successful.

**Finding Solutions** – After all the differences are out in the open, generally there is a sense of relief, when each has been allowed to express their viewpoints in an encouraging discussion. Now a real solution can be found, and it can often be much more creative that the original plan.

**Bonus** – Brainstorming sessions can be used to meld ideas into new activities and events or put a fresh face and new vitality into an established tradition. Allow all ideas, even those that sound silly, then shorten the list to include achievable goals. You may be surprised by what sounded silly at first may actually be just the ticket to add a fun new twist.


