## My Garden

What a wonderful time of the year! The flowers are so beautiful!



I enjoy the flowers, but I am not much of a gardener, and that's because I am not willing to invest the time needed to have a beautiful garden.

In many ways my garden reminds me of my spiritual life. First, I buy seeds or plants thinking that this year it will be different. But too often they don't get in the ground. The packets of seeds sit on my desk and the plants die.

In the same way, my Bible sits on the coffee table. I plan to read it, but I don't. Romans 10:17 says, "Faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ." Reading the Bible is hearing the Word of Christ. But just as the seeds don't grow until they are in the ground, my faith doesn't grow until I read and hear the Word of Christ.



Every time I hang out clothes I walk by a small flower garden beside the house. Early this spring I noticed weeds growing among the flowers. Many times I have walked by thinking I need to pull those weeds, but I'll do it later. Soon I don't even notice

the weeds because they have been there so long. Now they are huge and I'm going to have to work harder to get rid of them.

Similarly, sin is like a weed growing in my life. Sin often starts out as a bad habit that I know I should deal with right away. For example, every time I start to gossip, I know it's wrong and I need to stop gossiping. Sometimes I gossip with the excuse that I am concerned about the other person. Soon I don't even notice how often I am gossiping. Gossip has taken over a large part of my life. Now it's even harder to eradicate gossip from my conversation.

Occasionally I will buy a houseplant. The family joke is "How long will it live?" That's because I forget to water it. When my family tells me my plant is turning brown, I quickly flood it with water.

When a crisis comes along in my life, I open my Bible looking for guidance and comfort. But I often can't find anything helpful because I'm not familiar with the Bible. So I spend hours searching for something to help. I cry out to God, "Where are you?" He says, "I'm right here. Because you have failed to hide My Word in your heart, you have no reservoir of living water when you need it."

In my frustration to have a house plant, sometimes I resort to buying an artificial plant. Now I have something that looks good, but it's not real. There is no joy in seeing a new sprout or

a flower bud and it never changes or grows.

Sometimes my spiritual life is artificial too. I look good on the outside as I am doing some things so that it appears as though there is life. I am like the Pharisees that Jesus criticized in Matthew 23:5, "Everything [I] do is done for men to see."

In Matthew 23:27-28 Jesus says, "You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of dead men's bones and everything unclean. In the same way, on the outside you appear to people as righteous but on the inside you are full of hypocrisy and wickedness."

Gardens are here only for a season, and then we need to wait for another spring. Our souls are eternal. I pray that you are taking better care of your soul than I am of my garden; that you will be planted in the good soil of God's Word; that you will uproot the weeds when they are small; that you will nourish your soul; and that you will be real, not artificial.



## An invitation from President Kay



I know that prayer is an intrinsic part of my life and yours. How I would love to be able to sit with each of you, my sisters and brothers, over a cup of coffee or tea and pray together to our Father for our mites, our missionaries, and our grant recipients.


