

But, following the example of the Savior, also love those whom the Lord has placed into our circles of friends and family. The Gospel is simple, but the world is complex. How do we share the Good News of Jesus in today's world?



You may have heard about the Every One His Witness program being offered by the LCMS Synod. Well, here's your chance to complete the program with your LWML sisters in a relaxing environment. This program will be presented in its

entirety at the LWML Retreat on August 9-11, 2019, at Lutheran Island Camp.

What is Every One His Witness?

Every One His Witness is a Lutheran evangelism program that teaches you to witness to your friends, coworkers, and any other non-churched people you may know. Using the LASSIE approach to witnessing (listen, ask, seek, share, invite, and encourage), you will learn how to naturally share the Good News of Jesus Christ through relational, contextual witnessing.

What does this mean? It means listening to those who are unsure about Christianity. It means asking questions that aren't accusatory. It means sharing the Good News about Jesus. Notice how there's no bashing, no judgment, and no forced imposition of beliefs. Instead, there's understanding, communication, and honesty between friends. And Every One His Witness teaches you how.



Rev. Bruce Timm will be our facilitator for the program and each participant will receive a workbook and a journal as we learn how to witness to our friends and family. Please plan to join us for this enlightening way to share the Good News about

Jesus. A poster and registration form can be found on the LWML MN North District website and at the end of this newsletter.

The Assembly of Leaders and Leader Development Committee have completed the first three of six "Follow MY Lead" events. Each event was just a little bit different as we learned and fine-tuned our presentations. We had wonderful hosts in each region!

- † Our first event was held in Park II Region at Trinity Lutheran Church in Staples, MN, on April 27th. There were 80 ladies and seven pastors in attendance.
- † The second event was in Arrowhead I Region at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church at Esko, MN, on May 4th. There were 67 ladies and three pastors in attendance.
- † Our final spring event was in Park I Region at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, Crookston, MN, on May 11th. There were 48 ladies and six pastors in attendance.

The committee is very happy with the response of the first three events. We took a survey after each event which helped us to improve the event. The large majority of comments were positive; the negative comments were very helpful to us in future events.

The events had lots of information, fellowship and fun! We hope that everyone that attends these events goes away empowered, enlightened and entertained.

Recently the LWML Convention was held in Mobile, Alabama. Many convention decisions were made, but personally I feel that the mission grants that will be supported in the 2019-2021 biennium is the most exciting of all. Needless to say, it is my prayer that you will keep these new mission grants – as well as the grants for our LWML Minnesota North District, in prayer on a daily basis.

One of the district grants that has received \$5,000 to date through your mite offerings is the "Lutheran Island Camp and Christ Service Ranch Staff Growth and Training". As funds become available, another \$5,000 will be sent to the camp. It is a great blessing to have this camp in our district as it provides many opportunities year-round to reach out to many individuals of all ages by sharing the love of Jesus.

Our society has changed so quickly in so many ways—some good, and some "not so good". It is important that throughout the year the Lutheran Island staff receive trainings in conflict resolution, communication skills, problem solving, and active listening. Some of the children who attend may not have a church home or attend infrequently. For some children, this may be their first opportunity to hear God's Word. Many of these children come from blended families, single-parent homes, foster homes, or homes in which there are financial or other problems that the children face in their home setting. Not only



these children, but all who attend the various forms of ministry offered by the camp will benefit by having staff that is well-

equipped to handle challenges that might arise, and to direct those individuals to the healing power of God's Word. As individuals experience God's love towards them, the benefits of their camping experience at

Lutheran Island Camp will be a blessing that will last a lifetime.

Mission Grant Report

A total amount of \$19,000 in mites for LWML MN North grants was raised this past quarter. The Mission Grant Committee recommended and the BOD approved the payment of grant allocations as follows: \$4,500 for Scholarships for Men Preparing for Ordination; \$6,500 for Scholarships for Full-Time Church Work Students; \$3,000 for "Main Street Living North" Ministry Outreach TV Program; \$6,000 for Gloria Dei School and Church Building at Cap Haitian, Haiti. The chart below details the current balance remaining for the 2018-2020 biennium.

Standing Rules

During the past year, there have been many questions concerning Standing Rules. The following information was given to Structure Chairmen at the last national convention. . .

The Standing Rules direct the administration of the organization. They are more flexible than bylaws and are adopted by the membership as a need arises. Standing Rules are procedural rather than parliamentary.

When an organization adopts motions that are for a lasting duration, the Secretary should add them to a book entitled "Standing Rules". Each motion should be recorded in its final version as adopted and the date it took effect. If the rule is later rescinded, the Secretary should strike it out and make a notation when it was rescinded. By keeping a record of these motions, each new administration will know what they are required to do. It will keep continuity in the organization instead of new member perpetually having to ask long-time members what to do and when.

If an organization does things "because that is always the way it has been done", these customs should be written down so that everyone knows what to do. A custom becomes a force of law and needs a formal motion to rescind it just as if the assembly had enacted it. Perhaps the assembly enacted it many years ago, but members have forgotten this fact. The Secretary should keep a detailed copy of Standing Rules.

Some examples of Standing Rules might be:

- a guest register at the meetings
- a particular donation given to an organization at a certain time of year
- wearing name tags or special pins at meetings
- who is responsible for introducing guests
- · a specific month for the annual picnic
- the time for the meeting
- the place for the meeting
- who should take minutes in the absence of the Secretary
- motions of long-term affect
- who is responsible for opening up setting up the meeting, etc.

LWML Convention Mobile – Memories by the Young Woman Representatives

Warm and happy summer greetings, LWML friends! For this issue of the Minnesota Northern Light, I asked our Young Woman Representatives (YWRs) to the LWML Convention in Mobile to answer a few questions about their convention experience. Conventions are so JOYFUL, and I hope that hearing about the experiences of our YWRs in Mobile will encourage you to join your LWML sisters for the blessings that attending an LWML convention brings. Plans for our LWML MN North District Convention in Grand Rapids next June are underway; I hope that many of you are already planning to attend the convention. For now, I'll leave you with our Mobile YWRs' impressions of the LWML Convention in Mobile.



What was the most memorable part of the convention for you?



Miranda Garman, Messiah, Sartell: There is no way I can have a MOST memorable part of the convention as I consider the entire convention to be memorable! However, two of the events that had a significant

impact on me were the LWML banner processional and mission flag processional. While I carried our Minnesota North banner, it was exciting to see how many people from the Midwest made the 1,000+ mile journey down to Mobile, AL. It was incredible to see the work that the Lord has done in making disciples of all nations, not only here in Minnesota, or even the United States of America, but from other countries! Seeing 76 flags being flown in the flag processional from across the world was a

wonderful reminder of how vast God's love is for His people.



Daylin Paulson, Holy Cross, St. Cloud: There were many, many memorable parts of the convention for me, but one of my personal favorites was listening to the Mites in Action Speakers during the

convention meetings. At various times throughout the day we would get to hear from representatives of organizations that had received mission grants in the previous years. It was so amazing to hear how God was working through our mites to advance His kingdom and serve others around the globe.



What alu you ... at the convention? What did you learn about the LWML

Miranda: I learned many things about the Lutheran Women's Missionary League at the Mobile Convention. This included how business is conducted, the organization of the bylaws, and the committees and who was a part of them. I also learned a lot about our mites and how they are used. It is amazing that millions of dollars are raised just by collecting spare change. Our gathered pennies make such a positive impact on people all over the world. Through mission grants, the LWML will continue to provide organizations the means to offer clean water, healthcare, education, the Word of God, transportation for children and youth ministries, places for organizations to spread the gospel message, and trainings for others to share the gospel.

Daylin: I have to admit that before going to the convention I was not very familiar with the LWML's work at a national level. I was blown away with how big they really are! Seeing it on such a large scale gave me a better perspective on what the heart of LWML is all about. I got to meet so many Lutheran women from around the country and hear their stories. Many of them had joined LWML at different times in life or had come from different backgrounds, but they all had one thing in common: they all love the Lord and have a passion for spreading His Name to the nations.



What new ideas did you get that you will bring back to your own society or zone?

Miranda: I hope to encourage and involve as many women and people in our communities as we can! This can include inviting mothers to bring their children and family along for an LWML activity, making a family event out of it. Also, providing more opportunities for people to gather and connect with others will allow groups to grow and more people to participate. By meeting multiple times throughout the week (at different times of the day) for bible studies, group gatherings, servant projects, and volunteer opportunities, the LWML community will be more available for all people to serve the Lord with gladness. A few ideas to reach people who may not be able to make it to events include sending them candy grams, Mustard Seed devotionals, or have them become involved in the Mailbox Member Program.

Daylin: One thing that was talked a lot about was how to involve more young women. I am more convinced than ever that a personal invitation is the most effective way. After all, that is how I first became interested in becoming a YWR. I probably would have never considered applying if it hadn't been for the encouragement of the ladies at my church. Another idea is to spread awareness of the mission grants that are approved for the biennium. It would make such a difference for the congregation to know where the donations are going and exactly how their mites are changing lives.



What do you want other women to know about the convention?

Miranda: Every person that I met at the convention was so friendly and happy to meet me. It was very encouraging to be surrounded by 3000+ other Jesus-loving women who have the same beliefs as me. Everywhere I went there was someone to help me, support me, encourage me, and uplift me. I learned so much from not only attending the bible studies, convention sessions, and listening to speakers, but also from developing friendships with

other convention goers! We were able to learn and grow in our faith with one another and praise the Lord!

Daylin: What would I tell other women about the convention? Go if you can! It was such an amazing growing experience, and it would be sad for you to miss out. I wish every Lutheran woman could get a chance to go at least once (but of course, if you go once, you'll want to go again and again!)



Is there anything else that you would like to add?

Miranda: I would like to thank the LWML MN North District for this incredible opportunity! I am so blessed to have been able to spend the week among such great mentors.
