
The delegate assembly approved a \$147,000.00 Mission Grant goal for the 2024-2026 biennium. We pray that God will put this goal on our hearts so that the grants may be fully funded. The twelve grants approved are listed elsewhere in this newsletter.

Please keep the new officers on the District Board in your prayers as we move forward. We elected three new Regional Vice Presidents, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer and a new Park I Region Pastoral Counselor. You can find their names and offices listed in this newsletter.

Dr. Patrick Lovejoy presented two sessions of Bible Study that encouraged us to equip ourselves to face our problems, navigate through this difficult life and all the false teachings in the world. Katie Schuerman spoke to us about living a life that shines Gods light in all that we do. She related personal experiences and shared her beautiful singing voice with us throughout the presentation. While at the convention she visited with as many as she could, showing us her delightful personality as she got to know us.

All the breakout speakers were excellent. We were so fortunate to be able to secure each speaker. We heard about Parish Nurses, a topic unfamiliar to many, from Mary Scott.

Attributes of a Leader

Confidence in Christian leadership

is being grounded in the Word.

And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near (Hebrews 10:24–25).

No two groups of people have the same abilities because they are made up of unique individuals, each with their own set of Godgiven gifts. God has placed them together to achieve the plans that He has made for them. However, there are certain qualities that can be helpful in every effective leader:

Listening to and learning from others in your group can bring about meaningful discussion that could turn a good idea into a plan of active service. Whoever belittles his neighbor lacks sense, but a man of understanding remains silent (Proverbs 11:12).

Encourage others to use their talents and help channel them to where they are most effective within the group. *Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing* (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

An agreeable attitude will go a long way in keeping a discussion moving and finding a successful compromise when necessary. *If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all* (Romans 12:18).

Devote time to prayer. Pray for the guidance

God has promised to send, listen for His instructions, and move forward expecting Him to be there with you. *Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving* (Colossians 4:2).

Enthusiasm in your service to the Lord will set an energetic example for your group. When your energy is lagging, explain to your group what you are feeling and allow them to serve and support you. Don't rob them of an opportunity for service. *doing the will of God from the heart, rendering service with a good will as to the Lord and not to man,* (Ephesians 6:6b-7).

Rejoice in your role as leader. God has placed you in this position for a reason and He will not abandon you. He has planned your life down to the smallest detail and will walk with you every step of the way. *Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you* (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18).

Pray for and develop as many of these qualities as possible within yourself. Look for other leaders in your group with strong leadership qualities different from your own; mentor them and let them lead with you. Together your group can serve the Lord with gladness.

The District Young Women Committee received a Thrivent grant to cover the supplies and snacks for the convention.



Fleece blankets – Single layer, woven edge. Fleece will need cutting and weaving. The blankets will be donated to Perham 180, which provide transitional housing for recovering individuals and to a shelter in the Detroit Lakes area.

Fabric eyeglass cases – Simple sewing on a machine. We will be providing a few sewing machines to use. We will provide plug in space if you wish to bring your own machine. These cases are then donated to MOST Ministries

Article about Convention Keynote Speaker By Teresa Klatt, Outgoing Scholarship Committee Chairman



I had the pleasure to speak with our Convention keynote speaker, Katie Schuermann. Having read only a portion of her book House of Living Stones, Im hooked. I purchased three of her books that she was selling at the convention. I told her that I really enjoyed her Lutheran perspective. She responded, Aren't Lutherans interesting? with a big smile. I agreed. You know that feeling that you get when you meet a stranger and discover she has the same faith as you? Thats what it is like reading her books. It feels comfortable, like home, a breath of fresh air in

that she tells the story of just how human and interesting Lutherans are. She told me that her three book fictional series is modeled after the Anne of Green Gables series, written by L. M. Montgomery that she read as a child.

Katie has received multiple awards for her publications and is a popular speaker. She spoke on Tuesday afternoon about what she calls the death of her family as she wrote about in her book He Remembers the Barren. She spoke about being Lutheran, bursting into song at various points with the audience joining in with her sweet voice at times. She received a standing ovation.

2024 Convention Breakout Sessions



Breakout Session C – Rev. Mark Peske, Emotional Healing through the Gospel

Rev. Mark Peske presented his topic of Emotional Healing through the Gospel. We began by singing "Holy, Holy, Holy".

Jesus the great healer, heals physical problems as well as emotional wounds. We know that there are many relationship problems, rifts with God and addictions. The Bible tells us in Hebrews 12:15

"See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no "root of bitterness" springs up and causes trouble, and by it many become defiled."

Rev. Peske gave us some pointers that professionals use for helping people work through problems.

- 1. Just listen
- 2. Identify similarities in others
- 3. Bring God into this process
- 4. Find the root cause of the problem. Evil roots in resentment, guilt and fears.
- 5. Encourage others to tell their story
- 6. Identify the effects of the experience
- 7. Forgive the wrong suffered
- 8. Look to Christ for healing

From Matthew 6:14, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you," and from Psalm 147:3, "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds."

God's word from 1 Peter 2:24," He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed."



Breakout Session B – Mary Scott Parish, Nursing (Faith Community Nursing)

Mary Scott is the Minnesota North District Parish Nurse Representative to the Synod and is the Parish Nurse at Zion Lutheran Church, Sauk Centre, Minnesota. Her presentation defined what a parish nurse is and what it is not. She explained the functions of the Parish Health Ministry. She emphasized how this is not "hands on" care and does not replace Health Care services or Pastoral care.

Parish Nursing is a blend of nursing and faith. The nurse uses resources to promote wellness of Spirit, Mind and Body. The Parish nurse promotes and develops education programs for the congregation as well as providing consulting services for Health, Christian lifestyle, disability awareness and acts as a community liaison for the congregation.

The need for Parish nurses in the Minnesota North district is great. We currently only have 8 parish nurses and they are getting older. Perhaps there are nurses in the district willing to serve in this very important ministry. Applicants must be an R.N. with a current license. Offering information



Orphan Grain Train – Eugene Pasche

Eugene Pasche described how Orphan Grain Train started from humble beginnings as a Lutheran Layman's League project into it's current form serving needs in thirty-eight states and thirty-one countries. There are twenty-seven regional locations coast-to-coast and border-to-border. The organization has earned a four star rating (top ten overall) since 98.2% of what is donated goes to the mission.

Lutheran Island Camp – Stacy

Lung, Executive Director Stacy Lung thanked the LWML for it's continual support of Lutheran Island Camp indicating that a recent gift provided emergency repairs to the water heater. She reported that to date there were 800 registered summer campers and that they would focus on five of Jesus's "I AM" statements. After the LWML Retreat work will begin on the new dining hall. Due to \$2 million in fundraising efforts the debt has been paid off.

Swaddling Clothes – Rev. Don Stauty, Swaddling Clothes Rev. Don Stauty retired from the ministry in 2023, however, he continues to serve Swaddling Clothes, which is a mission of mercy for mothers and babies. It is an LCMS organization with two Minnesota locations but there are a total of twenty-eight locations nationwide. He indicated that most commonly the reason for choosing abortion is a lack of money, so this ministry, hopefully, provides an attractive alternative. Some of the items (car seats, strollers) rotate through the store after the child outgrows them. Diapers, formula and clothing are offered to support daily needs. A "designated grandma" provides babysitting allowing the parent to shop. He encourages everyone to establish a local center.



Scholarship Recipients – Mark Langton & Rebecca Pumphrey Scholarship recipient Rebecca Pumphrey was, unfortunately, unable to attend the convention due to a recent injury. However, scholarship recipient Mark Langton and his wife of eight years attended the convention. Mark wanted to teach K-12 music but the Lord called him into the ministry. He stated that LWML scholarships not only profoundly affect the recipients but they also set a foundation for future church workers.
