Based on the Biblical account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1-4), the Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" – offerings above and beyond the support given to the congregation and the Synod. Mite Box contributions amount to millions of dollars that fund district and national mission grants and implement the LWML program.



Mite Boxes are available from the district, zone, through the LWML Catalog, and/or online.

They are distributed to every woman in a society, and often to each member of a congregation. (Excerpted from the LWML Handbook, page 1, June 2017 version.)

Drop your coins (and paper money) into your Mite Box, asking the Lord to bless your offerings for the mission grants that have been chosen at the district and national levels.

There are prayers and Mite Box devotions available for you to use at your society gatherings. Some of these resources are available as free downloads at www.lwml.org.

Your society shall remit Mite Box contributions regularly to our LWML MN North Financial Secretary; individuals may send their mites to that same district financial officer. Her information can be found on the last page of this newsletter.

Creative Zone Events

Zone planing meetings are coming up and the discussion is always about doing something meaningful, fun and maybe even a little different. The LWML web site lists many ideas for zone rallies. The following ideas are just a few excerpts from “Creative Zone Events”, a resource that is available to download from the LWML web site at lwml.org. Click on the Service menu tab and then click on Leader Helps.

CREATIVE ZONE EVENTS

Adapt these suggestions to benefit your zone as each is unique and travel distance is a factor in planning events. Consider holding spring and fall gatherings at different hours (evening versus morning or afternoon) to accommodate women with various schedules. Be flexible!

MISSION EVENT

Invite a representative of a district or national mission grant recipient to speak. Perhaps a speaker from the mission field is available to speak in person or via Skype.

LEARN MORE ABOUT LCMS DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

Invite a representative to speak on a specific ministry and give suggestions how groups might become involved (e.g., Lutheran Social Service, youth ministry, parish nurses, or disaster relief).

JOINT ZONE EVENT

Host a joint event with other zones if geographically feasible. This widens the opportunity for fellowship and affordability of quality speakers.

ADDITIONAL THOUGHTS

- Invite a district representative to give a brief update on what is happening on the district level at each zone event. This can be any officer, committee chair, or pastoral counselor. Having district representation fosters a healthy zone-district relationship.
- Encourage interaction among participants by having attendees sit at a tables in special ways (birthday month, initials, color of shoes, etc.)
- Set time limitations for devotions, speakers, and business meetings. Let your attendees know what time the program will conclude so they may plan their time commitment.
- Give away LWML products and resources as door prizes and inform women the products are available on the LWML website.

Ideas for Mission Service...

Thanks to all societies and zones that submitted the Human Care Report. There was a good response from all 17 zones. Many new ideas for mission service were shared. Here are a few of the activities LWML members have been involved with this past year.

Kits galore?

- † Hygiene Kits for local Food Shelf to give out.
- † Backpacks with school supplies to Native Americans.
- † Infant kindness kits (diaper & clothing collection).
- † Many kits (health, layettes, school, back packs) were made and sent to Orphan Grain Train along with lots and lots of quilts and baby blankets and many boxes of clothing and shoes.

Fun activities?

- † Love in Action: Ida Sass exercise group at Good Shepherd.
- † Open gym – free community play-date for kids 8 and under to provide a location for parents to bring their little ones to play and interact with other kids when it's too cold for them to go outside. The kids enjoy active play, sensory play, group games, crafts and snacks (in Ely).
- † A church needed tree ornaments and the ladies made chrismons, photographed them, and made booklets with an explanation of the meaning of each.
- † Recycle used greeting cards for the Dakota Boys & Girls Ranch who use them to make new ones and sell them.
- † We give Portals of Prayer to the VA in our city – they look forward to receiving them.

How about food?

- † Our society purchases soup and crackers and along with homemade Christmas treats, delivers and visits with the homebound members of our congregation.
- † Our noodle-making brings men and women from the congregation together. Not only do they learn the process of noodle making but enjoy getting to know one another. The noodles are sold at our local craft sale and to our congregation. The profits fund many needs that come our way. We had money to share with a family from a different country who relocated to our area.
- † Served funeral lunch for delinquent member/family. They now come to church quite regularly and we are reaching them with hugs and encouragement.
- † We do an annual soup/meal/bazaar in December. Following the event we deliver quarts of soup and cookie plates to the shut-ins, nursing home residents and the sick. We spend time visiting with them.
- † Honor public servants (police, firemen, ambulance crew, sheriff dep't) make plates of goodies.

We can't forget about sewing?

- † At a sewing event, besides the regular ladies, 2 youth-aged boys came and cut material and sewed pieces and strips together.
- † A young lady made over 200 baby hats (for missions and local hospitals) and made youth and adult hats (for homeless shelter and Orphan Grain Train).
- † Donated money to 'Hope for the Destitute Mission – Africa' for purchase of sewing machines.

Proposals can be submitted by any member of the LWML MN North District, or any LWML MN society, zone, region, or member of the LWML MN North District Board of Directors.

There are many projects that are currently being supported by the LWML members of our district, many of which are in need of funding. If your project fits the criteria for a grant, you are encouraged to submit that proposal for potential funding. It is important to note that if your project is an International project, it must first be cleared through the LCMS office of International Missions. Contact information can be found at www.lcms.org/internationalmission.

Grant proposal applications can be found on our District website, lwmlmnn.org under Resources. Our Mission Grants Committee looks forward to seeing

the exciting opportunities for funding that will be submitted as grant proposals. If you have any questions, please contact me. My contact information is available on the District website. Blessings to you as you continue to serve the Lord in so many special ways.



Mission Grants Committee Report

A total amount of \$23,900 in mites were raised for LWML MN North grants this past quarter. The Mission Grants Committee recommended and the BOD approved the payment of grant allocations as follows: \$25,500 for Scholarships for Men Preparing for Ordination, \$12,900 for Scholarships for Full-Time Church Work Students, \$2,500 for Caring for Our Pastors (Doxology), \$3,000 for C.R.O.S.S. Appeal. The chart below details the current balance remaining for the 2016-2018 biennium.

7 GRANTS – PAID IN FULL !

We have one more quarter to go before this Biennium comes to a close and three more grants need our mite giving. Thank God for the blessing He gives us each day to be able to support the mission work of the LWML!



Many factors come to mind when we think of who we are — our identity. In his first letter, Peter continually reminds his readers of their identity. Rather than focus on inane worldly details, he zeroes in on what's most important: our standing in the eyes of God or our place in His kingdom.

Peter reminds his readers of who they were prior to being made part of God's family, contrasting that non-status with the present reality of what God had made them. This was especially important for Peter's readers as they compared themselves to the unbelievers around them, and as they fought to retain hope in what may have seemed like hopeless times.

Refined by God by Ruby Prochnow

Greetings from your District Public Relations Chairman. I am encouraging each of you to share with all the ladies of your society and congregation the Light of Christ. Share with them the joy that one receives in studying God's Word. Again I encourage each of you to make God's Word a priority in your life, whether it is in a formal group study or a personal study. You will make connections in your life to His Word.

Several years ago my husband and I visited a silversmith at the Jamestown Settlement in Virginia. As we watched him refining the metal at hand, I thought of the Bible verse: *"He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver"* (Mal. 3:3).

Shortly after this visit I found an article whereas a woman pursued her interest in the work of a silversmith to make the connection of his job and this Bible verse. She, too, visited a silversmith. She had watched the silversmith as he held a piece of silver over the fire and let it heat up. He explained that in refining silver, he needed to hold the silver in the middle of the fire where the flames were hottest as to burn away all the impurities. The woman thought about God holding us in such a hot spot. She then asked the silversmith if it was true that he had to sit there in front of the fire the WHOLE time the silver was being refined. He answered that he not only had to sit there holding the silver, but he had to keep his eyes on the silver the entire time it was in the fire. If the silver was left a moment too long in the flames, it would be destroyed.

The woman was silent for a moment. She asked the silversmith, "How do you know when the silver is fully refined?" He smiled and answered, "Oh, that is easy – when I see my image in it."

I, too, at this moment saw the connection. God is our SILVERSMITH. If today you are feeling the heat of the fire, remember that God has His eye on you and He will keep watching you until He sees His image in you.

an active LWML society. I have now been active in the LWML for about ten years. In that time, I have participated in as many LWML events, both locally and nationally, as I have been able to.

Looking to the future of the LWML, I think about what a wonderful part of my life I find the LWML to be, and I wonder why I didn't get involved sooner. I really encourage other teens, or young twenty year olds, not to miss out on years of enjoying the fellowship with other LCMS women. As the Young Women Chairman, I extend an invitation to all teens and young women to join us this June in Bemidji, MN. The Young Women Committee will be hosting a number of fun get-togethers for our younger convention goers. Attending a convention is always a great time!
